Cattle Producers Carry Beef's Message To Washington

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Americans are undernourished, representatives of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA) told USDA Food, Nutrition and Consumer Services Under Secretary Eric Bost in an April 11 meeting in Washington, D.C.

"We'd like to see more emphasis

placed on the role of beef's nutrients in healthful diets as the 2005 Dietary Guidelines for Americans are drafted," said Wade Zimmerman, a cattleman from Sugar City, Colo., and chairman of the Joint Industry Nutrition and Health Committee.

More than 250 cattlemen con-

vened in Washington as part of the NCBA Spring Legislative Conference April 9-11.

Too many school-aged children are missing out on key nutrients, like the zinc and iron readily found in beef, Zimmerman said, telling USDA officials that these nutrients affect their ability to learn.
