Dairy Producers, Agribusinesses Invited To Attend CWT Meetings

of the Northeast's major dairy cooperatives have joined together to host informational meetings on the (Cooperatives Working Together) (CWT) program.

The meetings are open to all dairy producers and agribusiness professionals who are interested in learning more about the details of this national program.

CWT was developed through the National Milk Producers Federation (NMPF) with input from dairy producers from across the country. Dairylea Cooperative, Dairy Farmers of America (DFA), Agri-Mark, St. Albans Cooperative, Allied Federated Cooperatives, Inc., Conesus Milk Producers Cooperative Association, Mount Joy Farmers Cooperative Association, Oneida-Madison Milk Producers Co-op, Cortland Bulk Milk Producers

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — Several Co-op, and other cooperatives have worked collectively to set up meetings across the Northeast.

> The CWT Program is a multidimensional, farmer-led and farmer-funded program created to improve milk prices by addressing supply and demand imbalances. There is an oversupply of milk of between four and five billion pounds. The CWT program will work to achieve its goal by providing incentives for increased butter and cheese exports and to encourage farmers to voluntarily reduce milk production.

> Regional supply issues have been taken into consideration in development of the CWT program. The program will guard against a disproportionate loss of production capacity on a regional basis.

The 32 cooperative members of NMPF are expected to formally approve and commit to investing in the program when they meet on May 9. The members of NMPF collectively market 70 percent of all milk produced in the U.S. Program details are expected to be released following this meeting.

The informational meetings in the Northeast will begin May 14 and continue through the end of the month. Additional meetings could be added in June and the cooperatives would publicize those meeting dates and locations when scheduled. All dairy producers, including members of the cooperatives hosting the meetings, members of other cooperatives, and independent producers are encouraged to attend along with members of the agribusiness community.

Extension Research Center, will give an update on insects found in orchards.


