EPHRATA (Lancaster Co.) — Benefit auctions are growing in popularity.

The auctions are held to raise money for nonprofit organizations such as fire companies, hospitals, private schools, churches, missions, and community betterment.

In a way, this also serves as a bit of advertisement for the volunteer auctioneer. People attending the sale become acquainted with the auctioneer and his or her style. Later, if the services of an auctioneer are needed, those in attendance may contact the auctioneer who they have seen in action and can trust.

It is not unusual for a benefit sale to garner \$100,000 and more.
