showers in the western corn-belt was
noted pressuring the corn trade. Soybean
bids saw declines. Census June crush re-
port numbers came in at 121.2 million
bushels, compared to 130.5 in May and
134.6 in June 2002. Wheat was 2-10
lower. Corn 2-3 cents lower. Sorghum 2-3

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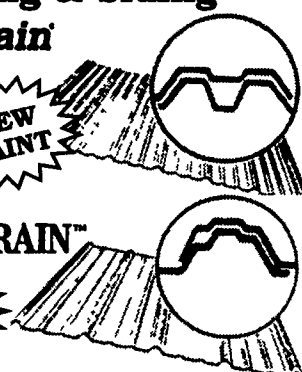
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
