Pennsylvania Youth Excel In Public Speaking Contest, Cow Awards At Holstein Convention

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. -Youth from the Mid-Atlantic area, Pennsylvania in particular, took home numerous awards for excellence in public speaking, as well as top breeding and production awards at the recent National Junior Holstein Convention in Winston-Salem, N.C..

More than 400 youth gathered from across the U.S. for the event. Ranging in age from nine to 21, these youth competed in numerous contests, held a junior forum, and mingled with other youth during fun-filled activities, all with the intent to strengthen their dairy knowledge while building friendships for the future.

The National Prepared Public Speaking contest drew a total of 38 contestants this year among the three divisions. Speeches were given on topics related to the Holstein and dairy industries. Each contestant was judged on organization of material, power of expression, voice, stage presence, and response to questions within an allotted time.

An anonymous panel of judges evaluated the scrapbooks on news clippings, photos, organization, originality and variety of activities, and the cover.
