

Cow From Longtime Family Line Named Supreme At Southcentral Junior Show

SHIPPENSBURG (Franklin Co.) — Andy Stoner's mom Rhonda had a favorite cow she used to lead in the show ring back in her days as a 4-H'er.

Although that animal was no champion in the ring, Rhonda said she loved her anyway because she was "a sweet cow."

But apparently that Holstein had more going for her than just a good-natured, loveable temperament. One of her offspring, shown by Andy Stoner, was chosen as supreme champion at the Southcentral District Junior Dairy Show at the fairgrounds here July 31.

Judge Alan Hostetter placed the 4-year-old cow, Bell-Stone Jubal Penny-TW, at the top of the show that drew 84 junior exhibitors with a total of 171 animals from seven breeds: Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey, Milking Shorthorn, and Red and White. Exhibitors came from several counties, including Adams, Cumberland, Franklin, Perry, and York.

It was the first year the judge picked a supreme champion at the show.

Andy Stoner, 17, has been in the show ring ever since he was big enough to handle animals. He is a member of the Quincy-Washington 4-H Club and is a senior at Waynesboro Area High School.

Andy helps out on the 45-milking cow dairy managed by Rhonda and his father, Lynn Stoner.

A 3-year-old Jersey shown by Logan Horst of Chambersburg was named the reserve supreme champion. The animal, Oshanda Dean Bambi, was bred in Ontario, Canada.

Horst is a member of the Hamilton-St. Thomas 4-H Dairy Club.

Other breed champions were shown by Janel Zinn of Newburg, Ayrshire; Zack Nell of Gettysburg, Brown Swiss; Kelly Johnson of York, Guernsey; Brian Nailor of Mechanicsburg, Milking Shorthorn; and Andrew Crider of Chambersburg, Red and White.

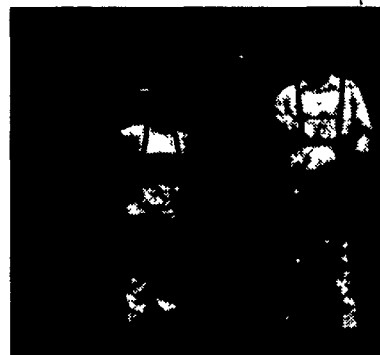

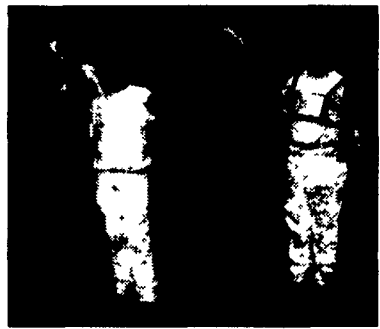

Distinguished Junior Holstein Members Named At National Convention

Thomas Harwood, Shippensburg, Makes The Cut

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. — At the recent 2003 National Junior Holstein Convention in Winston-Salem, N.C., the association named six distinguished junior member (DJM) finalists. Each of

them received a DJM pin and annual renewed membership to Holstein Association USA.

This is the highest honor the Holstein Association can bestow upon a junior member. This year's finalists were Anthony Brey of Sturgeon Bay, Wis.; Thomas Harwood of Shippensburg; Miranda Miller of Tillamook, Ore.; Bill Rauen of Farley, Iowa; Aaron Ray Tompkins, Ennice, N.C.; and Chad Wethal from Brooklyn, Wis.

Other semifinalists included John Cannon, West Union, Iowa; Benjamin Dorshorst, Junction City, Wis.; McKenzie Hanehan, Stillwater, N.Y.; Ann Haughian, Rice Lake, Wis.; Trent Olson, Lewiston, Minn.; and Robert Teixeira, Turlock, Calif.

Since its beginnings in 1922, the DJM program has grown and flourished. Each year, contestants submit an entry book to showcase their Junior Holstein work, activ-

ities, projects, breeding program, and personal views. An anonymous committee screens the books to select the twelve semifinalists. During the convention, each semifinalist is interviewed by a panel of judges. The combination of the scores determines the top six finalists.
