"These markets provide the perfect opportunity for people of all ages to enjoy the tastes of Pennsylvania's finest," Wolff

said. "I encourage all Pennsylvanians to take advantage of these venues, as well as the opportunities that are available for seniors and WIC participants to purchase produce through our Farmers Market Nutrition Program."

"The Pa. Department of Agriculture (PDA) and local farmers and retailers have created a partnership that enables consumers to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables through PDA's Farmers Market Nutrition Program," Wolff said.

Since 1992, the Farmers Market Nutrition Program has enabled participants of the WIC Program to take advantage of the health benefits of locally grown Pennsylvania produce.

In 1998, the Department of Agriculture expanded the program to include qualifying senior citizens. To qualify, seniors must be age 60 or older with an income last year of \$16,613 for a single person and \$22,422 for a couple.


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
