2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
 3/4 cup sugar  
 1/4 cups milk  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 egg  
 9 tablespoons shortening  
 Mix well. With rolling pin, roll in 10x15x1-inch pan.

**Filling:**  
 2 cans crushed pineapple  
 3 tablespoons tapioca or cornstarch  
 1 cup sugar  
 1/2 cup squeezed lemon juice  
 Cook until thicken. Cool and pour on shell.

**Topping:**  
 2 containers cottage cheese  
 2 tablespoons tapioca or cornstarch  
 4 tablespoons melted butter  
 1 tablespoon vanilla  
 4 eggs  
 1 cup sugar  
 Pinch of salt  
 1 can (13-ounce) cream  
 Make cottage cheese smooth by forcing through sieve. Mix all ingredients together. Pour over filling very slowly. Use a measuring cup so you won't get custard topping mixed in with the pineapple filling. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes.

## CHICKEN SPAGHETTI

1 large fryer, cooked, boned, and diced (6 large chicken breasts will do fine also)  
 1 pound spaghetti, cooked in the broth of the chicken you just did  
 1 large onion  
 1 bell pepper  
 2 stalks celery  
 1/2 cup butter  
 1 can peas (do not drain)  
 1 can diced Ro-Tel tomatoes, diced tomatoes and chilies  
 1 pound Velveeta cheese, cubed  
 1 small jar pimento  
 1 jar mushrooms, sliced  
 Boil spaghetti until cooked; remove chicken from broth (reserve). Cook the spaghetti in the chicken broth until tender; drain the spaghetti but reserve about 1/2 cup of the broth for a little later. Chop onion, bell pepper, and celery; saute in butter. Mix all ingredients together and pour into a baking dish. (Pour a little of the chicken broth over it to keep it moist.) Bake in 9x13-inch pan, covered, at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes until bubbly.

 Mix together, but reserve some of the crushed crackers for the top. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

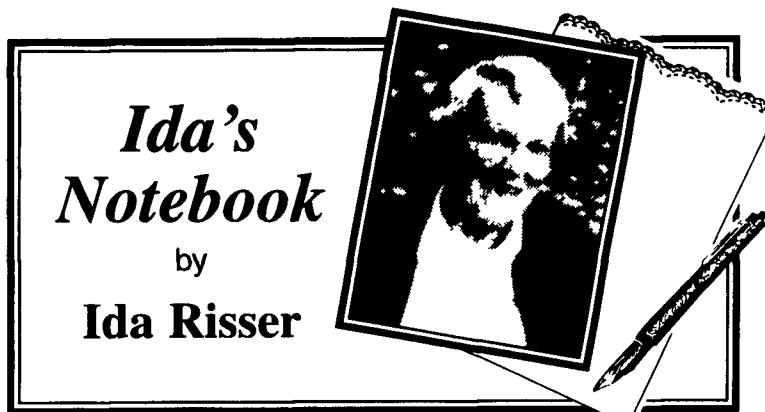

## SIMPLE LASAGNA ROLL-UPS

1 package (16-ounce) lasagna, uncooked  
 4 cups (32-ounce) ricotta cheese  
 2 cups (8-ounce) shredded sharp cheddar cheese  
 1 cup chopped fresh spinach  
 1 egg  
 3 cups (30-ounce jar) spaghetti sauce  
 Grated parmesan cheese  
 Heat oven to 350 degrees.  
 Cook pasta according to package directions; drain. Lay flat to cool.  
 In large bowl, combine cheese, spinach, and egg.

Pour 1 cup sauce on bottom of 13x9x2-inch baking dish. Spread about 1/4 cup cheese mixture on each piece of pasta to within 1-inch at one end; beginning at filled end, roll up jelly roll fashion. Arrange roll-ups, seam side down, in single layer in prepared dish; cover with remaining sauce. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese, if desired. Cover with foil. Bake 35 to 40 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Makes 10 servings.
