**NATIONAL YOUNG TURKEY PARTS AND BULK MEAT**, Frozen, unless specified, cents per lb, delivered first receivers, part and full trucklots, as of Sept. 10. Trade sentiment on white meat was steady to instances firm, mostly steady to fully steady. White meat demand fair to good. Some fresh tom breast meat buyers have reduced purchases and increased internal utilization of previously bought frozen inventories. Offerings of fresh white meat were light at best and held with confidence. The trade sentiment on tom bulk parts continued steady to firm on drums and wings, steady on necks. Demand fair to good for domestic and export shipments. Tom bulk parts offerings were light at best on drums and wings, necks adequate. Trading centered on light volumes of bulk parts, balance slow. Drums transferred in storage: hen 32, tom 33 cents.

Feedstuff prices were mix for the week. Demand was good for most ingredients but moderate for others due to increased production after last week's holiday. Soybean meal saw gains as futures continue to rally. Rain has been sufficient in some parts of the Midwest but dry in other areas.

**SOYBEAN MEAL:** 48 percent rail was 11.50-15.50 higher from 223.00-231.00. 48 percent truck was 11.50-12.50 higher from 224.00-230.00 per ton.

**CORN BY-PRODUCTS:** Gluten Feed 21 percent, Interior Points was steady to 2.00 lower from 58.00-72.00; Chicago was steady to 1.00 lower from 60.00-76.00. 60 percent Gluten Meal, Interior Points was steady from 245.00-250.00; Chicago was

steady from 250.00-255.00 per ton. Rail Hominy Feed, Central Illinois Points was 4.00-5.00 higher from 56.00-60.00; truck steady to 4.00 higher from 62.00-86.00. Crude Corn Oil was 25 to 50 points lower from 27.50-28.50 cents per pound.

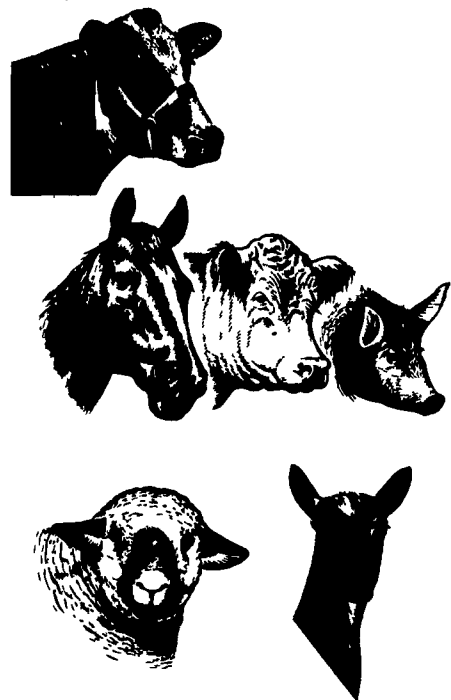

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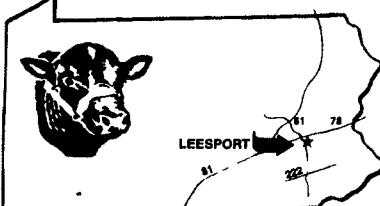


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
