## Nichol Awarded 2003 All-American Dairy Show Pioneer Award

HARRISBURG (Dauphin Co.) — The All-American Dairy Show has awarded William Nichol of State College the 2003 All-American Pioneer Award in recognition of his years of dedication and service to the show.

In the early 1960s Nichol, along with the late Cuthbert Nairn Sr. and other dairy enthusiasts, had a dream to institute a national dairy show in Pennsylvania in order to invite the nation and other areas to bring their cattle to Harrisburg to compete with the quality cattle bred in this state. In 1964, the first Pennsylvania All-American Dairy Show

was conducted in the Farm Show Complex.

Nichol, along with other breed representatives and agribusiness personnel, had been working approximately seven to eight years making necessary arrangements to institute this national show in Pennsylvania. Nichol helped to raise money from sponsors and supporters. He was a member of the first All-American Board of Directors as the Holstein breed representative. He helped to create the positions with a representative from each of the six dairy breeds along with two from the Pennsylvania Dairy and Allied Industries to complete the board.

Nichol was served on the committee establishing the rules and regulations for the All-American Dairy Show and was instrumental in developing the "Herd Unit" option for entering cattle in the show. In 1999, Nichol was influential in obtaining the necessary funds to increase the premiums offered to exhibitors. In 2000, the All-American Dairy show offered the highest premiums paid than any other national dairy show.

Nichol thought the premiums within the class should be uniform and there should be a bottom limit. These high premiums were paid out again at the 2003 All-American Dairy Show. He has been a member of the group responsible for the division of premium increments and has worked to keep the budget balanced.

Also in 2000, he was one of the enthusiasts that encouraged other board and dairy industry persons to change the name of the show by dropping the "Penn-

sylvania" from the title. He believed that by changing the name to the All-American Dairy Show, it would encourage all participants to feel as though this national show was "their own show." Many others agreed and in 2000, the official name change occurred.

Nichol continues to attend the All-American Dairy Show each year and his enthusiasm for the show never dims.




