

Accounting Workshop Set For Dairy Producers

UNIVERSITY PARK (Centre Co.) — Penn State Dairy Alliance asks: "Are you getting the most out of your information systems?"

To help producers make more effective and profitable decisions for their operations, Dairy Alliance is offering the program "Accounting Methods for Progressive Dairies" Nov. 4-5 at the Penn State Harrisburg campus. The

workshop is sponsored in partnership with Miller and Miller Certified Public Accountants, LLP and Red Wing Software Company.

"Having accurate and timely data to base decisions on is critical to operating a profitable business," noted Bradley Hilty, information specialist with Dairy Alliance.

The two-day program is an in-

teractive hands-on workshop to help dairy producers and accountants implement standardized procedures in their accounting programs to improve the quality of information provided for decision making.

The program is designed for producers, accountants, and financial officers of progressive dairy businesses. However, any producer of any agricultural

commodity will benefit from attending this workshop. Participants may attend one or both days, depending on their needs.

Instructors include Bradley Hilty, Michael Peachey, Matthew M. Hilton, Julie Strain of Red Wing Software, and Judy Kernen, a private consultant in accounting and business management.

The registration fee is \$150 for

one day and \$275 for both days. The cost includes lunch. A reduced rate is available for farms sending more than one person. The one-day rate is \$50 per each additional participant. The two-day rate is \$85. Pre-registration is required by Oct. 24.

N.J. Ag Secretary Urges Vote For More Preservation

TRENTON, N.J. — Agriculture Secretary Charles M. Kuperus recently announced the preservation of the prime 162-acre Evans Farm in Locktown, Hunterdon County, and highlighted the importance of Public Question #1 on the Nov. 4 ballot, which would boost the availability of preservation funding.

"The preservation of the Evans farm builds on the local, county and state partnership effort to protect this critical farmland area," said Secretary Kuperus. "To date, we've preserved more than 112,000 acres of farmland statewide. In November, voters have an important opportunity to build on that success to save even more farms, as well as protect addi-

tional open space and upgrade our community parks."

Approval of Public Question #1 on Nov. 4 would make an additional \$150 million available to preserve open space and farmland, and to improve community parks throughout New Jersey. The referendum proposes to increase the total amount of bonds issued by the Garden State Preservation Trust from \$1 billion to \$1.15 billion. The increased bonding would place no additional costs on New Jersey taxpayers. Approval of this question could provide up to \$30 million to save farmland in the Highlands region, which covers part of Hunterdon County.
