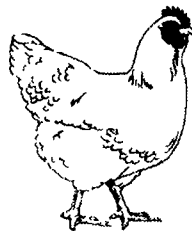

Live supplies were moderate; weights were mostly desirable. Processor schedules were moderate to moderately heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 60 to 70 cents. Trade sentiment was steady. In the parts complex, boneless skinless breasts were in good balance to closely cleared at some plants, ample at others. Bone-in breast were fully adequate. Mostly prices were higher on whites and whole, and generally unchanged on yolks when compared to the previous week's trading. Trade sentiment was fully steady to firm on whites, steady to fully steady on whole and steady to about steady on yolks. Demand was light to good with yolk offerings adequate but held with some confidence, whites and whole were tight and less available. Liquid and frozen eggs (ingredients included) processed under federal inspection in the Eastern region for the week ending October 18, 2003 were 2% less than the previous week, and 4% lower than a year ago.

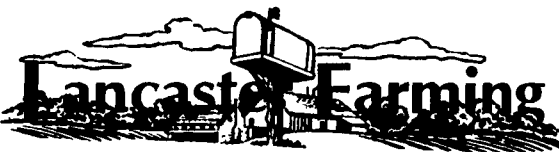
