Weekly Meat Production Under Federal Inspection

WASHINGTON, D C, Dec 12 - (USDA-NASS) - Total red meat production under federal inspection for the week ending Saturday, Dec 13, was estimated at 896.5 million lbs, according to the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. This was 0.7 percent higher than a week ago and 0.8 percent lower than a year ago. Cumulative meat production for the year to date was 1.3 percent lower compared to the previous year.

Compared to last week feeder cattle and calves sold 2.00-5.00 lower with many instances as much as 8.00.10.00 lower on both calves and vearlings. The market took back nearly all of last week's sharp advances on lightweight calves and really hammered those heavier calves over 550 lbs that had been holding respectable price levels amid moderate demand Yearling prices had been maintaining near record levels, although supplies have been very limited.

Over the last two weeks a few more of the heavier feeders have been showing up at the auctions but sellers were shocked this week when their precious yearlings fell on light demand It's as if all at once cattle feeders collectively decided that they can't give over 1.00 for 800 lb steers Hedging these high feedlot replacements against slumping spring futures is impossible Weakness came from all directions this week as significantly lower prices were posted on the futures, beef, and finished cattle markets But, perhaps the most damaging factor to blame for this week's losses on the feeder market was the weather Conditions were miserable in all five of the major feedlot areas as freezing rain, snow, and cold winds reminded cattlemen that winter is only about one week away Frigid temperatures on dry wheat fields across the Plains caused what little forage that was available to crawl back into the ground until February Backgrounders could barely get their tractors started to feed round bales to shivering and hunched-over cattle when their order buyers called on their cell phone to ask, How bout some more of those dollar thirty calves? A quick recovery may be difficult as the holidays will interrupt normal marketing for the next several weeks

Packers are putting off negative vibes and complaining about losing money, after lackluster post-Thanksgiving beef sales caused wholesalers to clam up and refuse dressed beef price lists However, the stock market got back to 10,000 points this week, its been a great year, and Santa Clause is comin'



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
