## **Shaver Introduces Two New Log Splitters**

Shaver Manufacturing is doing its part by introducing two new log splitters designed to help keep homeowners warm and pocketbooks from going empty.

The new shaver SL-2030-T and SL-2030-S Log Splitters eliminate the back-breaking work of manually splitting wood by slicing through cords of logs in almost no time. The units also virtually eliminate the added labor of loading logs onto the splitter platform.

Both units feature a unique three-way splitter configuration that allows the operator to choose between ground-level, waist-level or vertical setups.

This is especially useful when loading the splitter from a truck or from a tall stack of logs, or when the 'ogs to be split are too large or bulky to carry. Switching between each configuration is as easy as pulling a hinge pin.

SL-2030-T Three-Point Log Splitter is built for rugged use on all types of farms. The unit is powered by a tractor with a category I or II hitch and a mini-mum of 2000 psi. The splitter is operated from a lever at the side of the unit, so all log loading and splitting can erasily be done by a single operator.

The SL-2030-S Skid Steer Log Splitter is powered with a minimum 2000 psi. The unit is built for farms, rental operations and contractors. Mounted to a universal bracket, this unit also allows for easy one-person operation with a simple hydraulic lever.
