INTERNAL REVENUE IN THE 21ST DISTRICT.—The following statement shows the amount of Internal Revenue Taxes collected upon the Annual, Monthly and Special Lists, in the 21st Collection District of Pennsylvania, during the year 1867, and also the quantity of Distilled Spirits and Refined Oil produced, in the district, and placed in bond during the same period:

There were some 25,369 gallons of Refined Oil produced, which is not embraced in the foregoing statement. That quantity was not bonded, the taxes having been assessed at the refinery. The bonded oil was transported in bond to eastern districts generally, where the taxes are paid upon its withdrawal.

The larger portion of the whisky produced, was transported in bond, principally to Baltimore, the taxes upon which remain unpaid until it is withdrawn.

Oil and whisky are re-inspected at their withdrawal, and a credit allowed for leakage. This item is a pretty large one, and the revenue is reduced accordingly.

During the past year the oil refineries in operation were, one in Lawrence county, and three in Beaver county.

The Distilleries in operation were; three in Lawrence county, two in Beaver county, twelve in Washington county and fourteen in Greene county, making 31 in the District, producing 287,515 47 gallons.

The Messrs. Gray of Gray's Landing, in Greene county, produced 143,825 1 gallons of whisky during the year, the taxes upon which amount to \$287,790 20.

There are other sources from which revenue is derived—sugar, forfeitures and penalties for the non-payment of taxes. In this District they do not constitute any considerable portion of the revenues collected.

There are sometimes pretty large deductions from the amount of assessed revenue by abatements allowed the Collector for uncollectible taxes, by the remission of taxes improperly assessed and by the refunding of taxes improperly paid.—*Reports of Collector Reyle.*

DEMOCRATIC MASS MEETING ON SUNDAY.—We have heard the Rev. C. F. Claughton, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, preach a condensed production of all the sermons he ever preached in his life, (to use his own words.) Judging him by his effort of Sunday last we are prepared to say that he never did much good in the world in a spiritual way. The text was: "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ; for it is the power of God unto salvation, to those who believe." His argument (fanciful) may be called went to prove that the Kingdom of Christ was not of this earth. "That the salvation of man was to be worked out by spiritual means alone without the aid of secular power. This accounts we presume, for the 'divinity of Christ' and the grand part it takes play, or rather to, in the consummation of Divine will. And hence the objection in the South, to any interference with the 'institution.' Construe the saying of Christ. In a strictly literal sense and what would the effect of religion be among men? But, we do not propose to discuss theology as there would, no doubt, be as wide a difference between us as in politics. The parallel between himself and Paul in his fearless advocacy of the cause of Christ was good. Paul wrote to the Romans, he came in person. "Do unto others as you would that they should do unto you" was acknowledged to be a 'nice point' and one upon which he was careful not to dilate, further than to reprimand what he thought an unfavorable feeling against him before he was heard. We should like to have heard him further upon this 'nice point' but his christian spirit forbore. In fact the sermon was conservative in the extreme, with a free and liberal ground whereon to base his principles and a striking contradiction between the sayings and doings of the sect and people he represents.

As we have intimated, we would differ with the Rev. Claughton in religion and politics. But, for all that we are partial to his right to be heard. We may be censured for what we have said concerning him, but not justly when it is considered that all, and more too, was invited. Why was the meeting in the Court House when there are churches in our place, and clergymen, that profess the same politics of Rev. Claughton? Why the absence of anything that would give the semblance of an assembly for worshipping Christ? The matter was in the hands of Democratic politicians and no one assisted the reverend gentleman in the pulpit. Flocks of Democrats came in from the country as to a political gathering and men attended whose ears are not accustomed to hear the word of God. But for the women present it would have been considered a political meeting, as much so as if the most rapacious Copperhead of our acquaintance had filled the chair—with the *slight* differences of Methodist hymns, prayer, etc. We ask, why all this unless to invite comment? The Rev. Claughton, certainly knows, if not, we would have him, that we of the North differ from the South in the fact that here men are not ostracized for opinion's sake. It would certainly appear better if he would associate with men of his own calling, or brother laymen. If he does not preach political sermons he shouldn't "hang out the sign." Thus deceived we expected to hear him gibbet himself with his own arguments, but he was wary enough to forebear the risk. Let the gentleman keep in mind the old adage that "evil communications corrupt good manners" and morals; let him introduce himself to the people through the proper channels and he may be assured that he will be heard with due allowance for the many heresies of his doctrine. If not his motives and sincerity will be questioned, from the very reason that the people will think his policies and religion won't mix and therefore neither will be acceptable. There is a portion of our citizens that will object, at all times, to Democratic Mass Meetings on Sunday, whether for the furtherance of Southern missionary projects or the interests of their party.

SALES, FEBRUARY 1, 1868.
The tone of the market seems to be gradually improving, and merchants are looking forward with anticipation to a good spring trade. During the week there has been little or no variation in prices.

We quote as follows, which are the wholesale prices:

CONGRESS, SUSTAINED.

COPPERHEADISM REBUKED.

Gen'l John Beatty, the Republican candidate for Congress in the VIIIth District of Ohio (to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Hamilton), was on the 27 ult., elected by over one thousand majority. Last November, adds the *Tribune*, Gen. Hays had only 246 majority in the district. The result is especially gratifying and auspicious from the fact that the Democracy threw their whole power, with Andrew Johnson at their head, into this first election in 1868; that they did their utmost to get one fact to sustain their noisy clamor about Congress being repudiated by the people. Here was a test case; it was Congress versus Johnson; a Congressman was to be chosen; the district was to say the least very close, and needed but the change of two votes in a hundred from last October to give them the coveted victory. They canvassed the district with great spirit; their new Senator (Mr. Thurman) led the long list of speakers, among whom was not Vallandigham. That they confidently looked for victory was shown by the outgivings of their leading presses.

That "great Democratic reaction," which set in last summer and fall, and which, as we are told every day, the present course of Congress is sure to strengthen, received a bad set back. A Republican gain of over seven hundred votes in a single district, since last October, is a kind of reaction which applied to the whole State of twenty-one Congressional districts, would give a Republican majority of some eighteen thousand. We are afraid this is the kind of encouragement the secession Democracy expected. Their boasted reaction has come suddenly to grief. If Stanton's reinstatement, Grant's horrible treachery, the Jacobin doings of Congress, and the growing impudence of the reconstructed freedmen down South, can do no more than this to help along the great and glorious rebel cause, then hadn't the antireflected better try another tack?

TAXES DUE THE STATE.—Allegheny County is indebted to the State in the sum of \$27,542 03, taxes due and unpaid. Of our neighboring counties, Armstrong owes \$6,096 74; Cambria, \$6,824 24; Clarion, \$4,860 98; Erie, \$17,958 40; Fayette, \$9,914 50; Greene, \$6,790 59; Indiana, \$3,213 14; Lawrence, \$3,951 21; Mercer, \$2,825 31; Somerset, \$3,862 66; Venango, \$2,812 78; Washington, \$748 72; Westmoreland, \$12,730 36. The only counties which have paid their liabilities to the State are Beaver, Blair, Butler, Centre, Crawford, Delaware, McKean and Montgomery. The total amount due the State is \$664,886 19.

A GREAT pressure will soon be made to carry out the expansion policy—to increase by many millions, the volume of currency. Speculators are the head of this movement, and those speculators are Democrats who would break the faithful light of the nation, ruin the credit of the country, and plunge us into anarchy—all for dollars and cents and lust for power!

A Horrible Outrage.
A teacher of a colored school in Breckinridge county, Kentucky, proposed to have a concert and exhibition on Christmas Eve. She was warned that it would not be permitted, but still went on with her preparations. The exhibition was finally held in one of the colored churches, which was packed with the friends of the school and children. Within a few minutes after the exercises closed, but not until the people had left, the church was blown to pieces by the explosion of a keg of powder that had been placed under the platform on which the children were seated, and probably touched off with a slow match. An explosion during the exhibition would probably have destroyed the entire audience.
