THE BARONET DEBT.—Among the local bills passed in the House last week was one reported by our representative, as "An Act (No. 116) authorizing the burgess and town council of the borough of Waynesburg, in the county of Greene, to levy and collect a special tax for the payment of the present indebtedness of the borough." This was at the request of our "Town Council and numerous citizens." Two mills on the dollar is the amount to be collected. It is comparatively a light tax, but we would infinitely have preferred to see the waste land in our corporate limits sold to pay the debt.
