THE STUDY OF THE SOUTH. The Southern planter, observes the Philadelphia Post, is refusing to employ the Freedmen, are doing all in their power to perpetuate their own poverty. To discourage labor is to starve themselves. They act, as did Mr. Mulligan, a descendant of the Kings of Munster. One bitter night, when the thermometer was at sixteen degrees below zero, a starving dog invaded Mr. Mulligan's pantry through a broken window. Mr. Mulligan rose several times and expelled the intruder. At last Mrs. M. missed him for a long while, and on looking from the window, beheld him standing shivering in the moonlight, in his bare feet, gazing fixedly at the dog, which he held at bay with "his glittering eye." "What in the world are you doing there, Mr. M.?" she asked. "Mrs. Mulligan," replied the Fenian solemnly, while his teeth chattered in his head, "I'm going to freeze the internal base to death!" In this spirit the industrial classes of the South propose to punish the freedmen and the loyalist. There are people who cannot credit all that is said of the equality of the South to the Union, and consider the Kuk Klux Klan as an invention of Republican malice. But the infamous threats and counsels of the Southern press are proof enough. Here is a specimen of Rebel literature from The Tala (Miss) Gazette. "The Southern people will never follow the cry 'God and morality'—negro-worshippers—upon stealing—white-men-hating—outside of the Constitution—black and white blood mixing—woman-cruelty—baby-throwing—New England Yankee clock-peddling—chicken-stealing—low quality—lumpy—stank—round-shouldered—hypocritical—canting—rain-singing—cowardly cut-throat—blundering—vulgar—shameful—out-of-control—eating—whiskey-drinking—game—stuffed—squanders. Of the Kuk Klux Klan The Richmond Examiner says: It is now very evident this 'Kuk Klux Klan' is not a meaningless Merry Andrew organization, but that under its cap and bells it hides a purpose as resolute, noble, and heroic as that which inspired the crusades. It is the mask of well-organized liberty. The Kuk Klux Klan have distinguished themselves only by murder and burglary. The Examiner must be understood as recommending these crimes to its readers. In keeping with this advice is the frenzied effort of The Montgomery Advertiser to inspire a new rebellion. We have a right to appeal to the 'affirmative' from the valleys should go up the devious shafts of an outraged people! From the hill tops should blaze forth the fiery cross of vengeance, and the will of Alabama, from the rivers to the Gulf should thrill once more beneath the hot breath of freedom. By the memory of Alabama's sons who died in glory on the plains of Chalmette, at the victory of House Shoals, at the battle of Chickamauga, at Shiloh, and at Mission, we would say strike! Strike for your altar and your flag! Strike for the great principles of your rights! God and your native land! These are a few of the many extracts we could give, and we think few loyal men would be willing to reduce people of this kind to full citizenship. So long as the Southern Rebels believe in persecuting Union men, their policy in the South is not only just, but merited. There is much nonsense about the injury the South will sustain from the Reconstruction laws, but how can it expect to prosper when it wages deadly war upon its laboring population, and stifles persistently to keep away the Northern capital it needs! TERRIBLE ACCIDENT IN A MINE.
