#### Resolution Proposing Amendments to the Constitution OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Section 1. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be and the same are hereby proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, under and in the Constitution of the Common of the tenth article accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof, to wit:

Proposition 1, To be anticle M. Secretary of the Commonwealth.

Proposition 1. The aggregate amount of debts hereafter contracted by the Commonwealth shall never exreed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars, except
a case of war to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or to redeem the public debt of the Commonwealth, and the money so raised shall be applied to
the purpose for which the debt may be contracted, or

all be cancelled from time to time in a manner to shall ever be applied to the payment of the debt of five hundred thousand dollars mentioned in the first section of this article, but the said sinking fund shall ings. be applied only to the purposes herein specified.

Section 3. The credit of the Commonwealth shall owner or stockholder in any company, association or corporation in this Commonwealth or elsewhere,

section 4. The Commonwealth shall never assume the debts of any county, city, berough or township, or of any corporation or association, unless such debts shall have been contracted to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or to defend the State in war.

PROPOSITION 2, TO BE ARTICLE XI. Prohibiting Municipal Subscriptions.

The Legislature shall never authorize any county, city, borough or township, by vote of its citizens or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any joint stock company, association or corporation, or to raise mon-ey for, or loan its credit to, or in aid of any such company or association.
