Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylva-uia in General Assembly met, That the following a-mendments be and the same are hereby proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, under and in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof, to wit:

The aggregate amount of debts hereafter contracted by the Commonwealth shall never exceed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars, except in case of war to repel invasion, suppress insurrec-tion, or to redeem the public debt of the Common-wealth, and the money so raised shall be applied to the purpose for which the debt may be contacted, or

be applied only to the purposes herein specified.
