If practice upon this principle gives the Teacher more labor, it will ensure him a higher reward and the Pupil a thousand-fold more benefit.

During the past year an *Astronomical Apparatus* has been procured, at a cost of \$60.

Separate entrances and separate seats are appropriated to the Male and Female Departments. It has long been a desideratum with the Principal to introduce a thorough and scientific study of vocal music as a part of the Academic Course. It will now take its place by the side of Grammar and Arithmetic as a daily recitation. We hope to wipe off that reproach for Deficiency here which lies so justly against most of the Schools and Academies of England and America.
