Mr. Byerly was very much opposed to the idea, and did all in his power to prevent his offspring from going. The old gentleman stood in the doorway of his residence when the son departed, and gazed after him until he had vanished from his sight, when scalding tears commenced coursing down his cheeks, and he seemed perfectly overpowered with emotion.
