

THE MARKETS.

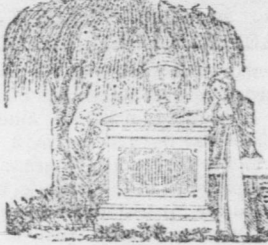
PHILADELPHIA MARKETS, JUNE 10.—The flour market is exceedingly quiet to-day, there being very little demand either for export or home consumption, but prices are firm. Sales of a few hundred barrels for shipment at \$7.50 per barrel for standard brands, and \$7.75 for extra. The sales of the trade range from \$7.50 up to \$8.75 for common and fancy lots, according to quality. The market is nearly bare of Rye Flour and Corn Meal.—We quote the former at \$5, and the latter at \$4 per barrel.

GRAIN.—There is a fair demand for prime Wheat, but there is not much of this description offering, and 300 bushels Spring sold on private terms, and small lots of red at \$1.80 and white at \$1.90—1.92 per bushel. Rye is not so much inquired after—a sale of 500 bushels Pennsylvania at \$1.45, but buyers generally refuse to pay this figure. Corn is dull, and prices have declined 2 cents—sales of yellow at 92 cents. Oats are dull at 60 and 61 cents per bushel.
