Because, although the bill purports to be a sale of the Main Line, it, in reality, more resembles a gift to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, if that company should obtain it on the terms proposed. The extraordinary exten-sion of credit, the low rate of interest, the re-lease of the tonnage tax, and the exemption, forever, from all other taxation or duties for state purposes, will enable that company to li-quidate every dollar of the purchase money be-fore the last payment shall be mature, by mere-ly appropriating, for that purpose, the taxes from which they are thus released.

Because the bill does not contain a sufficient guarantee that the Western division of the Main Line "shall be kept in good repair and operating condition;" thus establishing an invidious distinction between the Eastern and Western portions of the State, although both have contributed proportionally to the burden of constructing and maintaining the entire line.

6th. Because the bill does not require that the President and Directors of the company, purchasing said line, should be citizens and residents of the State. The importance of such a requirement is manifest from the fact, that under our general law, only a majority of the Directors of Canal and Railroad companies need
