

A Test of Negro Rights.—The Stark county Democrat relates the particulars of an incident which recently occurred in Canton, Ohio, illustrating the present position of the Black Republican leaders and the quandary in which they are involved. It being Court week, the public house there was unusually crowded, and the hosts while attending to their numerous friends at the first dinner table, observed a colored individual about the hue of his satanic majesty, safely located among his Republican brethren, and evidently preparing to do justice to the ample repast before him. Mr. Ellison, the landlord, politely requested his Black Republican friend to wait and eat at the second table. But the stomach and disposition of Sambo (who, by the way, was gentle enough to all appearance) declined to yield to the request, thinking he was safe among his Republican friends. Mr. Ellison, however, was disposed to get rid of the "colored gentleman," and took hold of his collar to help him out. Sambo resisted. Employees of the house lent a hand and he was ejected after quite a struggle, *volens volens*. The remarks made by the dorkie after the ejection was served upon him, were quite interesting. He said that if this was *Republicanism*, to drive a man from a dinner table provided for the public, he wanted no more of it. He reminded his Republican friend, Ellison, that he electioneered with him last fall at his coal pits to use his influence for Fremont.

FUNERAL OF W. L. MARCY.
ALBANY, July 8th.—The city is crowded. Ex-Presidents Van Buren and Pierce, ex-Governors Seymour, Hunt and Fisher, have arrived, to attend the funeral of W. L. Marcy. All the buildings along the line of march of the funeral have been hung with drapery.

[SECOND DISPATCH.]
During the morning a great number of people visited the Capitol to take a farewell look at the remains of Mr. Marcy, and expressed astonishment at the request of his relatives that the coffin should not be opened. The stores on Broadway and State streets were draped in mourning for three miles. Owing to large arrivals of visitors from other cities, the funeral ceremonies were not commenced till three o'clock. The ceremonies commenced at the Capitol, amid the tolling of bells and the firing of minute guns. The venerable Dr. Nott opened by an eloquent prayer; the Rev. Dr. Sprague read portions of Scripture, and the Rev. Dr. Hague delivered a beautiful discourse. The exercises closed with a prayer and benediction from the Rev. Dr. Welch.

Gen. Wood officiated as Grand Marshal of the day. Ex-President Van Buren, Governor Hunt and Ex-Governors Hunt, Fish, Seward and Buck, and the Hon. Nathaniel P. Banks, and other distinguished persons were present. The funeral cortege was the largest ever seen in Albany. The day was fine and everything passed off well.

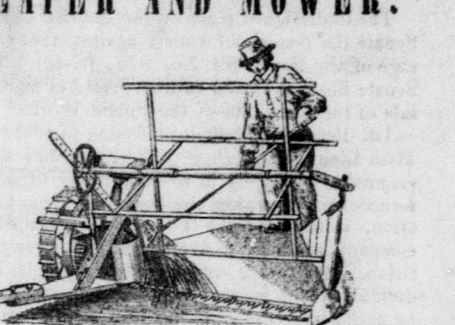
