MEETING OF THE BUCHANAN CLUB .-The largest meeting of this association that has yet been held during the present campaign, assembled in the Court House, on Saturday evening last. The meeting was called to order by Hon. Jos Mann, President of the Club, and was ably and effectively addressed by Gen. Bowman, O. E. Shannon and G. H. Spang, Esgs. The speakers were frequently interrupted with loud and continued applause.

The speech of Mr. Shannon, was an able and searching exposition of the frauds practised by the Abolitionists of this county, last Fall, in obtaining the Fillmore vote for their own candidate, Fremont. He showed from the files of the Abolition organ in this place, that whilst it pretended to be supporting Fillmore, it was sublishing articles deeply tinged with the doctrines of the Fremont party, and that with Fillmore's name at the mast-head, it was secretly and indirectly laboring for the success of his Abolition opponent. He referred to the fact that this same Abolition organ had made a very favorable notice of Cov. SECTION 1. That, for the purpose of ascertaining the sense of the citizens of this Commonwealth in

regard to the adoption or rejection of said amend-ments, or either of them, the Governor of this Commonwealth shall issue a writ of election, directed to the Sheriff of each and every County of this Commonwealth, commanding them to give notice in the usual manner, in not less than two newspapers in each County, (provided that so many are published therein,) that an election will be held in each of the townships wards and districts therein, on the second Tuesday of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, for the purpose of deciding upon the adoption or rejection of the said amendments, or any of them; which said elec-tion shall be held at the places, and opened and closed closed; and it shall be the duty of the Judges, Inspectors and Clerks of each of said townships, wards and districts, to receive at the said election, tickets, West End, 17 miles West of Bedford, on the Glade either written or printed, or partly written and part-ly printed, from citizens duly qualified to vote for Members of the General Assembly, and to deposit NE PERSON for the office of Auditor for said county.

The election to be opened between the hours of 7 and 8 o'clock in the forenoon, by public proclamation, and to keep open till 7 o'clock in the evening, then the polls shall be closed.

Members of the Geleral Assembly, and to deposit them in a box or boxes to be for that purpose provided by the proper officers, which tickets shall be respectively labelled on the outside, "First Amendment," "Second Amendment," "Third Amendment," and those who are favorable to said Amendments or any of them, may express their desire by voting each as many seperate written or printed; or partly written or printed ballots or tickets, containing on the inside thereof the words "For the Amendments," and those who are opposed to such amendments, or any of them, may express their opposition by voting each as many seperate written or printed ballots or tick-

ets, containing on the inside thereof the words, "Against the Amendments." SECTION 2. That the election on the said proposed Amendments, shall, in all respects, be conducted as the General Elections of this Commonwealth are now conducted; and it shall be the duty of the return judges of the respective Counties and districts thereof, first having carefully ascertained the number of votes given for or against each of said amendments in the manner aforesaid, to make out dupli-cate returns thereof, expressed in words at length, and not in figures, only one of which returns made shall be lodged in the Prothonotary's Office of the Court of Common Pleas of the proper County, and the other sealed and directed to the Secretary the Commonwealth, and by one of said Judges de-posited forthwith in the most convenient Post Office. And the Judges of the respective districts afore said, are required to meet at Bedford, on the Friday next following the holding of said election, then and there to perform those things required of them by
