THE FAIR of the Bedford County Agricultural Society, held in this place on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week, was largely attended by people from every part of the county.

The display of machinery was very good. Among the many useful articles on exhibition in this department we noticed a Corn and Cob Mill, presented by our friends Blymire and Hartley.

The live stock was of superior breeds, and a number of fine horses were shown off by their owners.
