CARE OF COLTS THROUGH THE WINTER.

It was formerly almost universally the practice and no doubt is yet to some extent for farmers to think that a colt could be wintered almost anyhow -i. e. very! cheap-by being turned out in the field with a privilege of the NEW AND VALUABLE BOOKS TO BE DISnorth side of a hay stack, taking his chance with a lot of cattle, or, perchance allowed to lie in the barnyard with little or no shelter, and with less care-feeding only on the coarsest fodder, and not any grain, as the idea was then prevalent that grain was not good for colts.

Well, now, how does this theory seem when sense? Does it look at all :easonable that you would get a better horse by thus inhumanly abusing and half starving the poor creature while thus in his "tender years?" No brother farmers, this is not the way to raise good hourses; but just puttithem in a warm, stable and a while thus in his "tender years?" No brother ses; but just put them in a warm, stable and a reasonable amount of grain daily, with, plenty of good substantial food, and also a regular diurnal dose of the "card," and my word for it you will find it will pay as well as the same care bestowed upon any other species of stock. Indeed a colt once stunted by poor keeping during the first year or two of his life, rarely recovers much of a horse as he otherwise would.

My own course of feeding for yearlings has been once a day, a feed of two quarts of oats and plenty of clean, bright oat straw, and once a day half a peck of carrots, with a good fodder of hay-in a warm stable with plenty of littering .- Homestead.

The proper management of sheep is a matter of very great importance to the farmer. He may procure the best breeds, and yet a bad location and bad management may soon destroy them.
