We have been led into these reflections by an appeal which is now put forward on behalf of a second class French poet. Monsieur Alphonse Lamartine, it seems, though munificenty paid for the productions of his pen, neglected to lay up any sufficient store for the support of his declining days; and now his voice is raised against "the ingratifude of the human race." The argument which he produces to strengthen his claim, is one which should rather make him blush for his extravagance: he savs that millions of his productions have been sold, and that therefore the world is in his debt But why? Was he not paid the price he as-ked for every copy? Or does he think that it sounds like common prose honesty to ask to be

paid twice over.

He will answer, doubtless, that his poems gave a pleasure the value of which their price could not approximate. Let us admit this rule, and apply it to another case to test its merits. Health we all know, is the chief of earthly blessings; and a boon which must be purchased, let the cost be what it may; a blessing, to be blessed with which the sinking monarch would resign his kingdom. Suppose then, that Holloway, instead of fixing such a price on his remedies as would afford him (when myriads) were his customers) a fair and honorable profit, had apportioned the price of his pills and ointment to the exigencies of each case and the ability of the sufferer to pay for his physical salration!
