A Combined French and English Fleet for the United States.

The news that the French and English Governments are fitting out "a powerful fleet of war steamers for the United States," excites much curiosity and speculation. The Paris correspondent of the New York Times says that the suggestion came from England-that France will furnish three first class new frigates, and that the English contingent will perfleet is not known, and it will probably sail with sealed orders. The Times' correspondent

says :-"We may surmise, however, and it is in-tended as an audience for the struggle which is soon to take place between brothers escort of honor for the funeral of the Great Republic. 
