WILLIAMSBURG, May 6, 1862. To the Hon. F. M. Stanton, Secretary of War: I have the pleasure to announce the occupa-tion of this place as the result of the hard-fought action of yesterday. The effect of Gen. Hanection of vesterday. The effect of Gen. Han-cock's brilliant engagements, yesterday afternoon, was to turn the left of their line of works. He was strongly reinforced, and the enemy aban-doned the entire position during the night, leaving all his sick and wounded in our hands. His loss yesterday was very severe. We have rome three hundred uninjured prisoners, and more than 1,000 wounded. Their loss in killed is hea-

I have sent cavalry in pursuit.

The conduct of our men has been excellent. with scarcely an exception.

The enemy's works are very extensive, and exceedingly strong, both in regard to their position and the works themselves

Our loss was heavy in Gen. Hooker's division, but very little on other points of the field. General Hancock's success was gained with a loss of not over twenty killed and wounded.

The weather is good to-day, but there is a great difficulty in getting up food, on account of the roads. Very few wagons have, as yet, come

Yorktown, Tuesday May 6, 1862. Yesterday morning our troops followed up the retreating Rebels with great rapidity, and overtook them at Williamsburg, where they fought

At the outset we took two of their works, and were advancing; but the exhaustion of those o our regiments which were carliest in the field and which had no provisions during the day, compelled them to fall back, as they were utterly worn out. One of our batteries was lost by getting inbedded in the mud, and its horses were shot. General McClellan arrived on the ground at five o'clock, and assumed command. He directed all our exhausted troops to retire, filled that places with fresh men, drove back the enemy, repossessed the ground taken in the morning, captured another breastwork, and took about one handred and

Hancock's brigade made a most brilliand charge. The firing was kept up until after dark, at which time everything looked well. To-day the whole army, reserves, regulars, and all, is ordered up, and the battle will be renewed if

A strong force has gone to West Point, and will attack the Rebels in the rear.
FURTHER PARTICULARS.

Williamsburg, May 6.—The enemy evacuated this place and their works last night, the rear guard passing through about 6 o'clock this morn

At nine o'clock General McClellan and escori entered the town, and took possession. About one hundred and fifty of the enemy's sick and wounded were left behind without any rations, medicines, or surgeons. They also left a number of their dead unburied.

All of our wounded in yesterday's engage ment, who fell in their hunds, were left behind. Col. Dwight, of the Excelsior Brigade, who was severely wounded in the engagement of yester day, and taken prisoner, was also left in the hos

The enemy suffered terribly. General Rick etts was killed.

The enemy had a force here yesterday of .50, 000 men, and only decided to evacuate after the brilliant charge of Gen. Hancock. The town is very pleasantly located, and the majority of the white inhalitants are remaining. The num-ber of the enemy now in our hands is about 1,-300, including the wounded.

THE FIGHT BEYOND WILLIAMSBURG. BALTIMORE, May 8 .- The following is furnish ed by the special correspondent of the American, dated Yorktown, yesterday:

At twelve o'clock, to-day, as I close my letter,

the latest intelligence received from the field of battle is, that General McClellan has come up with the enemy about three miles beyond Wil-liamsburg, and after a pretty severe skirmish with his rear, has again put him to flight across

the Chekahomany creek.

A large additional number of prisoners have been taken, including deserters, who report that they had nothing to cat but a few hard biscuits for forty-eight hours, and when brought in the child. in, they fell down in a state of exhaustion.

Heavy cannonading could be heard by the boats coming down the river early this morning. Nothing as to the results is ascertained.
