Pennsylvania Hospital.
(From Official Hospital Reports.)
May 19, 1860.—Ella S., at 28, single, never
very strong. Two years ago she had an attack

relapse for four more. She has been well since, then
till last Saturday; when engaged in house-cleaning
she took cold, had pain in her back, felt cold but
had no decided chill. Two days later her ankles
began to swell, which was followed by swelling of

pain in her shoulders, and her knuckles are very
tender, red and painful; both hands are affected,
but the right is most so. This, then, is a case of
