**Pennsylvania Hospital.**  
(From Official Hospital Reports.)  
MAY 19, 1860.—Elias S., et. 23, single, never very strong. Two years ago he had an attack of acute rheumatism, from which he was confined to bed for two weeks, and subsequently from a relapse for four more. She has been well since then till last Saturday; while engaged in house-cleaning she took cold, had pain in her back, felt cold but had no decided chill. Two days later her ankles began to swell, which was followed by swelling of the knee joints and of the hands. She has now dull pain in her shoulders, and her knuckles are very tender, red and painful; both hands are affected, but the right is most so.
