The Poor alone to be Conscribed. One of the most odious features of the Con-scription Act, is that which enables the rich to from military duty and forces the poor escape from military duty and forces the poor to take their places in the army. Under one of the provisions of this act, every man who is able to raise the sum of three hundred dollars can be exempted from conscription, thus giving the power into the hands of those who are well to-do in the world, to throw the whole burden of the military service upon the poor men o Not only is this unjust and cruel the country. to those in indigent circumstances, but also it will operate to defeat the ostensible purpose of the law, to wit, the raising of troops for the war. It is a well ascertained fact that a very large proportion of the poorer classes are alrea dy in the army; at least such a per centage of them as will render it impossible to collect a sufficient army from their number to prosecute the war with vigor, much less to subdue the rebellion. Hence the conscription, although every poor man will be dragged into the army will fail to reach the object for which it was apparently enacted. Sorrow and misery will Tall upon thousands of families already in the most reduced condition of life; famine and starvation will be added to squalor and rags; the bitter cry of houseless women and breadless children, will swell the choras of despair; and yet the arm of the Government will not be materially strengthened, nor the nation enabled to extricate itself, by force of arms, from the iron clatches of war.

But Congress did not design that the Concription should succeed in raising an army .-The leaders of the Abolition majority in that body (now happily defanet) were intent upor two things only in the passage of that Act .-First, they found it absolutely necessary, in order to sustain the financial credit of the Government, to resort to some extraordinary measare of taxation, and hence the adoption of the \$300 equivalent. Secondly, they discovered by the returns of last year's elections, that the classes voted against them, and, there they so framed their law that those trousters would be forced from the ballot

The craming and chicanery of these political iends have no parallels in history. Why even Machiavelli and Bolingbroke were saints comared with these Abolition conspirators. But heir diabolism will soon come to an end. It has been loosed for a little season, but populat centiment is even now forging a chain that shall bind it for a thousand years.
