The Board shall examine them and determine upon their fitness for the service, and if found to be fit, the Provost Marshal of the District shall give them transportation tickets to the general rendezvous, at the headquarters of the A. CIRCULAR No. 8.—WAR DEPARTMENT, Provost Marshal-General's Office, Washington City, May 25th, 1863.
The attention of all officers who have been honorably discharged, on account of wounds or disability, and who desire to re-enter the service in the Invalid Corps, is called to the provisions of General Orders, No. 105 of 1863, from the War Department, published in the papers, throughout the country. Such officers are required to send their written applications as therein provided, for positions in the Invalid Corps (stating the character of their disability), with as little delay as possible, to the Acting Assistant Provost Marshal-General of the State in which they may be. Such Acting Assistant Provost Marshal-General will at once forward the applications, with the endorsement, to the Provost Marshal General at Washington.
Officers for the Invalid Corps will be appointed immediately upon furnishing the papers required by General Order No. 105, of 1863, from War Department. Their pay and emoluments will commence from date of acceptance of such appointments, and not from date of organization of the respective commands to which they may be assigned.
