
agent who is or shall be employed under the legis-lature, executive or Judieiary department of this State or of any city, or of any incorporated district, and also, that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select or common coun-eil of any city, or Commissioners of any incorpora-ted district, is by law incapable of holding or exer-cising at the time, the office, or appointment of Juage, Inspector or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of such election shall be eligible to be then voted for.

And the said act of assembly entitled "an act re-lating to elections of this Commonwealth," passed July 2d, 1819, further provides as follows, to wit : "That the inspector and Judges shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the district at which they respectively belong, befors 8 o'clock in the morning of the 2d Tuesday of October, and each said inspector shall appoint one clerk, who shall be a qualified voter of such district. "In case the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend on the day of any election, then the per-son who shall have received the isecond highest number of votes for Judge at the next preceding election shall act as inspector in his place. And in place; and if any vacancy shall continue in the board for the space of one hour after the time fixed voters for the township, ward or district for which such of the shall epoint an inspector in his place; and if any vacancy shall continue in the board for the space of one hour after the time fixed by law for the opening of the election the qualified voters for the township, ward or district for which such officer shall have been elected, present at the election, shall elect one of their number to fill such a vacancy. 

Provided, That the white freemen, citi-zens of the United States, between the age of twen-ty-one and twenty-two years, who have resided in all be entited to vote, although they shall not have paid tax. "No person shall be permitted to vote whose


