Wood Ordinance.

An Ordinance to Regulate the Sale of Wood in the Borough of Bedford.

SEC. 1. It is hereby enacted by the authority of the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Bedford, That after the 23d day of November, 1863, every load of wood sold in said borough, to any eitizen of said borough, shall first be inspected and measured, by a measurer, or inspector who shall be appointed for that purpose by the Burgess and Council; and the said measurer or inspector shall receive from the seller of each load 52 measured—if the quantity exceed three-fourths of a cord—the sum of fifteen cents; if less than three fourths of a cord, then ten cents for each load measured and inspected then ten cents for each load measured and inspected by him. And the said measurer of inspector shall give to the owner of each load, so measured, a printed certificate of the amount over his signature as inspector. SEC. 2. And it is further enacted, that any seller
