



And the said measurer or inspector shall give to the owner of each load, so measured, a printed certificate of the amount over his signature as inspector. Suce 2. And it is further enacted, that any seller of wood who shall violate section first of this ordi-

Sec 3: And it is further enacted, that any seller of wood who shall violate section first of this ordi-nance shall be subject to a fine of two and a Lalf deliars, and the purchaser shall be subject to a like penalty. And the said fine shall be collected by the wood inspector, by a summary proceeding, before any Justice of the Peace in and forough—one-nalf of said fines to go to him for his trouble, and the batance to be paid into the treasury of said borough. Sec. 3. And the seliers atorcand shall drive to the Wood Stand to have their loads measured.
