

A Joint Resolution Proposing certain Amendments to the Consti-

tution.

Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in ancordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof:

article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

"Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified elec-tors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the Pres-ident of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors my exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election.

Section 2. There shall be two additional sections of the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight and nine, as follows: "Section 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legis-lature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except ap-propriation bills."

ECTION 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers or privileges, has been, or may hereafter be, conferred pon the courts of this Commonwealth HENRY C. JOHNSON,
