

The Rebels Attack Our Right-Frightful Losses in the Fifth Corps.
HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC,
Thursday, May 18, 6 P. M.
About 5 o'clock this evening, the rebels made a dash on our extreme right, held by Warren, but were driven back after an hour's fighting.
It is reported that the rebels captured some of our wagons this afternoon.
The positions of the several corps have been changed somewhat.
The rebels are moving on their right. All this afternoon their troops could be seen moving through Spotsylvania Court House toward our left.
The losses in the Fifth Corps since the movement began are as follows: Killed, 1,240; wounded, 11,570; missing, 1,120. Total, 13,930. Less missing than in any other corps. The stragglers are estimated at about 12,000 in the whole army.

Rebel Accounts of Sigel's Defeat—They Claim a Complete Victory over Grant.
WASHINGTON, May 22.—Richmond papers of the 19th instant, claim a great victory over Sigel at New Market, and say they would have captured his army had it not been for our Cavalry.
According to their accounts Sigel ran 20 miles without stopping, abandoning his hospitals, burning his trains, &c. Their papers state their losses at 20,000 in the battles with the Army of the Potomac, but claim a victory every time.
They acknowledge losing 20 guns, but are silent as to the number of prisoners.
Trains were running to Guinney's Station during last week.

The Secret "Union Leagues."
The Abolition party is getting into trouble with its secret so-called "Union Leagues." At an Abolition County Convention in Lancaster, on the 25th ult., the following resolutions were adopted:
Resolved, That the thanks of the Union party of Lancaster county, through its delegates this day assembled in County Convention, is hereby tendered to the Examiner and Herald, Express, and Volksfreund, newspapers, for their determined and persistent efforts to expose and warn the people of the designs of a few men to control and manage the nominations of the Union party of the county, by means of a secret, out-of-bound organization, to which only such as are disposed to be submissive and willing instruments are admitted.
Resolved, That such an oath-bound organization is known to be in existence within the Union party of Lancaster county, is both a disgrace and a fraud upon the party, and members of it who procure their nominations through and by means of it, are unworthy of and not entitled to the votes of the people at the polls.
Resolved, That the County Committee is hereby instructed to require a written pledge from all candidates that they are not associated with, bound to, or under any oath or obligation to such an organization.
