Pro-vided, That the white freemen, citizens of the U. States, between the age of twenty-one and twentytwo years who have resided in the election district ten days as aforesaid shall be entitled to vote, although they shall not have paid tax.

"No person shall be permitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants, All examinations will begin at precisely 2 o'clock,
A. M., and those wishing to be examined must be
produce a receipt of payment, within two years of


