The arrangements for the education and muintenance of the destitute orphans of the soldiers and sailors of the State, under the act relating to the subject, being now sufficiently completed to enable the committee appointed for the purpose to receive applications, notice is hereby given that blank forms of applica-tion, with the necessary instructions, have been deposited with the chairman of the committee, from whom the relations or friends of the phans can obtain them.

When the application and statement is each ense should be property filed and swom to, and certified by the Board of Common School Directors of the district in which the crphan resides, it is to be returned to the person from whom it was received, or to some other mempetintendent.

In a short time after fue receipt of the applicetion by the Superintendent. If it be in due form, and the orphin be entitled to the benefits of the act, an order for the admission for the proper school will be sent by mail to the mether, or other applying relative or friend, with necessary fragmentions.

It is expected that the schools selected, for these orphans will be ready set, their reception daring the month of distributes Their, friends will therefore take the necessary steps and have them ready for admission by the 1st of No vember at the latest.

The State will provide clothing, boarding washing, mending, instruction books, dec., the orphans while in the schools provided for them, but the relatives or friends are explanted to send them thither, without cost to the State, and also to send with them, in as good 'order as possible, such clothing as they may then have, to be worn till others can be provided for them.
