That every person excepting Justices of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, or of this State, or rust under the United States, of al fins State, or any city or corporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislature, executive or judiciary department of this State, or of any city, or of any incorporated district, and also, that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated dis-trict, is by law incupable of holding or exercising at the time, the office or appointment of Judge, In-spector, or Cirk of any election of this Common-wealth, and that no Inspector, Judge or other offi-cer of such election shall be eligible to be then vo-

And the said act of assembly entitled "an act re-

lating to elections of this Commonwealth," passed July 2, 1819, further provides as follows, viz: "That the Inspector and Judges shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the district at which they respectively belong, before So'clock in the morning of TUESDAY OF NOVEMBER, and each said Inspector shall appoint one clerk, who shall be a qualified voter of such dis-

shall have received the second highest number of wotes for Judge at the next preceding election shall act as Inspector in his place. And in case the persen who has received the second highest number of votes for Inspector shall not attend, the person electif any vacancy still continue in the board for the space of one bour after the time fixed by law for the opening of the election the qualified voters of the township, ward or district for which such officer aball have been elected, present at the election, shall elect one of their number to fill such vacancy.

Wit shall be the duty of the several Assessors re-

spectively to attend at the place of holding every general, special or township election during the whole time such election is kept open, for the purpose of giving information to the Inspectors and Judge, when called on, in relation to the right of any person assessed by them to vote at such election, and on such other matters in relation to the asseasment of voters, as the said inspectors or either of them shall from time to time require.

"No person shall be permitted to vote at any elec-tion as aforesaid, than a white citizen of the age of twenty-ene or more, who shall have resided in this State at least one year, and in the election district where he offers to vote, ten days immediately pre-ceding such election, and within two years paid a ceding such efection, and which two years pain a State or County tax which shall have been assessed at least ten days before the election. But a citizen of the United States who has previously been a qual-ified voter of this State and removed therefrom and returned, and who shall have resided in the election district and paid taxes, aforesaid, shall be entitled to

district and paid taxes, aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote after residing in this State six months. Provided. That the white freemen, citizens of the U. States, between the age of twenty-one and twenty-two years who have resided in the election district ten days as aforesaid shall be entitled to vote, although they shall not have paid tax.

"No person shall be permitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants, furnished by the Commissioners, unless: First, he produce a receipt of payment, within two years of State or County tax assessed agreeably to the Constitution, and give satisfactory evidence on his own oath or affirmation of another that he has paid such a tax, or in failure to produce a receipt shall make oath to the payment thereof; or second, if he claim a right to vote by being an elector between the age of twenty-one and twenty-two years shall depose a right to vote by being an elector between the age of twenty-one and twenty-two years shall depose on oath or affirmation, that he has resided in the State at least one year before his application, and make such proof of residence in the district as is required by this act, and that he does verily believe from the account given him that he is of the age aforesaid, and given such other evidence as is required by this act, whereupon the name of the parameters of the parameters. from the account given him that he is or through foresaid, and given such other evidence as is required by this act, whereupon the name of the person to admitted to vote shall be inserted in the alphabetical list by the Inspector, and a note made opposite thereto by writing the word "tax." if he shall be admitted to vote by reason of having paid tax, and the word "age" if he shall he admitted to vote by reason of age, and in either case the reason of such a vote shall be called out to the cierks, who shall make a like note in the list of voters kep, by them.
