#### THE WAR.

We have already stated that as late as Monday last no Federal troops from Schofield's camp Mortimer, Jos. Diesbrow, J. Roler, J. Lingefel- had been able to march from Wilmington westward towards Georgetown, the direct road to Sherman's camp. Several attempts had been made, but all had been checked by the Confederates. We now have advices as late as Wednesday last, from Layetteville, northwest of Wilmington. This town stands upon the other route to Sherman's camp. No Federal troops had at that time advanced from Wilmington towards Layetteville. In spite of reports from Wilmington, therefore, we cannot see how Sherman and Schofield can have formed a junction. Sherman is fast in the mud between Columbia and Cheraw. The rivers are swollen; the swamps impassable, and he seems unable to move in any direction. The Confederate steam-Layton, P. Pencyl, A. Richey, J. Roush, Oliver er Chichamanga has been burned on the Cape Fear river, above Wilmington, to prevent her capture. There are curious reports from Wilmington and Washington that Sherman has reached Fayetteville, and that gunboats have been sent up the Cape Fear river to that town. These reports are at least premature, We print this morning an official gazette from Washington, and it says not a word on the su'j ct.

There is no cessation in Gen Grant's preparations for a gigantic expedition from Hatcher's run, on the left of his line. He may be expected to march as soon as the freehets abbeide, and for no Federal troops from the east can get to him, and the Confederate army in his front is strengthening every day.

General Sheridan's advance south along the Shenandoah valley began on Monday last .-General Hancock was placed in command of Winchester during Sheridan's absence. We have no news direct from Sheridan, but Gereral Grant telegraphs from City Point that deserters say Charlottesville was captured on Thursday last, 1,800 prisoners, including General Early, being taken. Whether this is true or not cannot yet be decided .- Age.
