[From the Ohio Statesman.] Soldiers' Letter to General Cox--They Ask him to Define his Position.

Some days ago we learned, incidentally that a number of officers and soldiers, who have seen service during the late war, had addressed a letter to General Jacob Dolson Cox, the Republican candidate for Governor asking him certain questions as to his views about Restora-tion and Negro Suffrage. We have succeeded in procuring a copy of the letter, which we print below. We understand that it was handed to the General the day it was written; but it has not yet been answered, as we are informed. It is as follows:
