THE MANNER OF VOTING .- The following act, regulating the manner of voting, has passed both Senate and House, and gone to the Governor for his approval :--

SECTION 1. The qualified voters of ough and special elections, are hereby hereafter authorized and required to vote by tickets printed or written, or partly printed and partly written sev-erally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the name of all the judges of courts voted for, and to be labell-ed outside "judiciary;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all State officers voted for, and labelled "State;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including the office of Senator and member of As county officers voted for, including the office of Senator and member of As-sembly, if voted for, and members of Congress, if voted for, and be labelled "county;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all the township officers vo-ted for and labelled "township;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers voted for and be labell-

ed "borough," and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot-boxes. this Commonwealth to insert in their election proclamations hereafter issued,
