Secretary Seward Transmits the Report of the Joint Committee to the State Executive--The President Advises its Rejection. In the House of Representatives ves

terday, the Speaker laid before the House the following message of the President, which was read and referred to the Committee on Reconstruction: To the Senate and House of Representa

I submit to Congress a report of the retary of State, to whom was referred the concurrent resolution of the 18th inst., respecting a submission to the Legislatures of the States of an additional article to the Constitution of the United States.

It will be seen from this report that the Secretary of State had, on the 16th inst., transmitted to the Governors of the several States certified copies of the joint resolution, passed on the 13th inst., proposing an amendment to the

Even in ordinary times, any tion of amending the Constitution must be justly regarded as of paramount importance. The importance is, at the present time, enhanced by the fact that the joint resolution was not submitted by the two Houses for the approval of the President, and that of the thirty-six States which constitute the Union, ought to be put "in the penitentiary of eleven are excluded from representa-tion in either House of Congress, although with the single exception of Texas they have been entirely ed to all their functions as States, in conformity with the organic law of the land, and have appeared at the National Capitol by Senators and Representatives, who have applied for, and have been refused admission to the vacant

Nor have the sovereign people of the nation been afforded an opportunity of expressing their views upon the important question which the amendment involves. Grave doubts, there fore, may naturally and justly arise as to whether the action of Congress is in harmony with the sentiments of the ople, and whether State Legislatures, elected without reference to such an issue, should be called upon by Congress to decide respecting the ratification of the proposed amendment.

Waiving the question as to the Conmerits of the article which it submits through the Executive Department to the Legislatures of the States, I deem it proper to observe that the steps taken by the Secretary of State, as detailed in the accompanying report, are to be considered as purely ministerial, and in no sense, whatever, committing the Executive to an approval or a recommendation of the amendment to the State Legislatures or to the people. of the letter and spirit of the Constitution, as well as of the interests of na tional order, harmony and union, and a due deference for an enlightened mendment to the Constitution ought to be proposed by Congress and press edupon the Legislatures of the s States for final decision until after the admission of such loyal Senators and Representatives of the now unrepresented States as have been or with the Constitution and laws of the United States.
