Deeds not Stamped.—It may be well enough to know that a late act of Congress requires all deeds dated between the 1st of October, 1862, and the 2d day of May, 1865, to be stamped, under severe penalties. To avoid the penalty imposed, those who have had unstamped deeds recorded should have them stamped at once, and the record corrected accordingly. Hereafter, deeds not stamped at the day of execution can only be stamped upon application to the District Collector of Internal Revenue.
