enfranchised by Congress, and thus the

voting population of eleven Southern States (including Tennessee) has been doubled. Heretofore, but three-fifths of the African population of those States were counted in the apportionment of members of Congress. Hereafter all of that population will be counted in making such apportionment. An important result of this change, will be a large increase of the number of members of Congress to be elected by those States. Under the next apportionment the South, owing to the enfranchisement of the Africans, will have a much larger representation in Congress than it had during the palmiest days of the institution of slavery.
