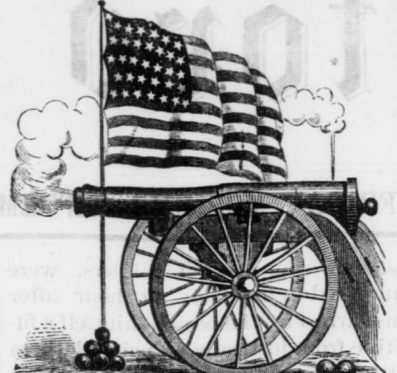
BE ASSESSED!
