That the qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth, at all general, township, borough and special elections, are hereby, hereafter so the several counties of porougn and special elections, are hereby, hereal-ter, authorized and required to vote, by tickets, printed, or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally classified as follows: One tick-et shall embrace the names of all judges of courts voted for, and to be labelled, outside, "judiciay." one ticket shall embrace the names of all ate officers voted for, and be labelled, "state; state officers voted for, and be labelled, "state;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including office of senator, member, and members of assembly, if voted for, and members of Congress, if voted for, and be labelled, "county;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all township officers voted for, and be labelled, "township;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers voted for, and be labelled, "borough;" and each class shall be deposited in seperate ballot-boxes.
